The rendezvous point for the paddle cleanup was at Dooks Wharf in Eastern Passage right across from

Rumor has it that one of the woodsman working on the island did upright the outhouse last spring, but was told by his superiors to tip it over again.

#### McNabs Island Hurricane Juan Restoration

Most McNabs Island trails are now open with the exception of the Pond Trail and Lighthouse Road. The Pond Trail travels along the southern end of McNabs Pond and passes by the ruins of the Peter McNab I homestead. Natural Resources contractors have not cleared this trail. The Lighthouse Road was washed out by the hurricane which means that the Mauger's Beach Lighthouse is inaccessible.

Most of the trails now look like logging roads and many of them are heavily rutted and full of standing water. Natural Resources tells us that work will begin this winter to cut and remove all damaged spruce trees from the island. Since most of the island is spruce cover, this will be a major forestry operation.



#### McNabs and Lawlor Islands Management Plan

The Park Advisory committee met in September to review the final draft of the Management Plan. The Plan has been sent to the Minister of Natural Resources for approval and signing.
