Four HRM Councillors visited McNabs Island on September 11, 2009 to walk the trails that they are helping to rebuilt. Eight councillors are contributing to the McNabs Island Trail Project with funds from their District Capital Funds. Councillors supporting our project include:

Fort Hugonin Today

A Happy Ending for Fort Hugonin

Fort Hugonin, or Hugonin Battery, has been the subject of several articles in The Rucksack. The most extensive article was written by Barry Edwards in Volume Fifteen: Issue 1: Fall 2006.

The fort is located between Garrison Pier and Fort Ives, on the western shore of McNabs Island overlooking Halifax Harbour. Currently, Hugonin is owned by the Department of National Defence and will most likely be sold to the provincial government to be included in the park.

Construction of Fort Hugonin began in 1897 and was completed in 1901 as part of the Halifax Defence Complex. Upon completion, the gun battery consisted of four 12-lb rapid-fire breech loaded guns. Two of these guns were moved to

Royal Artillery Park in 1905 for drill practice but by the time World War I began they were back at Fort Hugonin. The guns were removed between World War I and World War II but two were returned at the start of WWII. However, these, along with the soldiers stationed there, were moved to Strawberry Battery, also on McNabs, in 1940.

Today, all that remains at the site is the officers' barracks and the four gun emplacements. The barracks, built in 1900, was a basic one story concrete building. After Fort Hugonin was decommissioned in 1940, a second story was added and the building was used by the military as a "listening post" to monitor ships' traffic in Halifax Harbour. It also served as a caretaker's residence until 1993 when it was closed. It has been empty ever since.

In the winter of 2008, the Friends of McNabs Island Society learned that DND had called for tenders to demolish Fort Hugonin. This was in preparation for handing the site over to the provincial government. The Friends then became involved in trying to save the building. There was certainly some hazardous waste such as asbestos, lead paint and PCB's that required removal but it was felt that the building itself had historic significance. See Volume Sixteen: Issue 2: Winter 2008 of The Rucksack for the Friends appeal to save the building.

Cathy McCarthy of the Friends of McNabs Island Society deserves a lot of credit for getting the media and the public involved in these efforts. A number of people who had been stationed at Fort Hugonin

expressed their concern about the demolition. The Department of National Defence took the time to revisit the site and decided that the original part of the structure could/should be saved. This past winter, they removed the top story and took the hazardous material off the island.

This is a good example of the power of the people. Enough people from a variety of backgrounds became involved and vocal to preserve this historic building. Thank you to all who responded.

The property is still in the hands of the Department of National Defence and we look forward to the next development. Fort Hugonin could certainly be put to good use as an education centre, an interpretive site for the military history of the island, or a picnic site..... the possibilities are endless.

McNabs Island Trails to get Upgraded

In recent years, the island's trail system has deteriorated quite a bit. Those of us who visit the island are used to jumping over puddles or skirting around wet areas. Many of the trails were damaged by heavy machinery used to clear them following Hurricane Juan. As well, the century-old Garrison Road receives a fair amount of heavy traffic because it also serves as a maintenance road for the park.

With little hope of any funding from Nova Scotia Natural Resources, the government department

responsible for the provincial park, the Friends of McNabs Island Society took action as the stewards of the island to find funding for the trails. The net result is we have raised \$250,000 to rebuild the trails on McNabs Island from the following agencies that support our vision for McNabs Island:

\$70,000 NS Health Promotion & Protection
\$50,000 HRM
\$20,000 HRM Councillors (generously donated from their district funds)
\$50,000 Parks Canada
\$60,000 National Trails Coalition

NS Natural Resources has offered the services of its staff to prepare a construction plan and to help oversee the project. We hope to go to tender very soon since funding for this project must be spent by March 2010.

\$250,000 may seem like a lot of money, but this is only one quarter of the estimated cost to rebuild the trails on the island. Although rebuilding Garrison Road could easily swallow up all of our trail money, we want to fix up other popular trails too.

Our priorities for this first phase of the McNabs Island trail rebuilding project include:

- Sections of Garrison Road from Fort Hugonin to the Hugonin-Perrin Carriageway;
- Farrant Rd from the Old Military Rd to the Findlay Farm site;

• Hugonin-Perrin Carriageway located north of Teahouse Lane off Garrison Road;

Wambolt Trail to Back Cove;

• Colin Stewart Trail, which winds around McNabs Pond to the ocean; and

• Brow Hill Trail, which leads to Fort McNab.

This ambitious project will be greatly appreciated by those who visit McNabs Island. On behalf of all island visitors, we thank those agencies that have generously donated towards the McNabs Island Trail Project.

The Friends of McNabs Island Society has members from far and wide. We also have a number of members who have never been to the Island but who support the work of the Society. McNabs Island Trail Volunteers needed

The Friends of McNabs Island have had a longstanding trail maintenance agreement with Parks Canada to look after the trails and the McNab Family Cemetery near Fort McNab National Historic Site. Each year our Trails Committee and other volunteers visit the island during the fall and winter months to cut down brush in the cemetery and groom the trails near Fort McNab.

Once the trail-rebuilding project is completed, our trail maintenance responsibilities will increase since we will be responsible for the maintenance of these rebuilt trails.

Our Trails Committee is organizing a safety training session this fall to better equip our volunteers to handle equipment needed for trail maintenance.
